Friends of Trees Crew Leader Emergency Preparedness

Please Read Before Administering First Aid:

If the injured party is conscious, consent must always be obtained before any first aid can be administered. Furthermore, in accordance with the Good Samaritan Law, you must never administer first aid beyond the level at which you have been trained.

If administering First Aid, you must use Personal Protective Equipment at all times, such as nitrile gloves, and a CPR mask if you need to administer CPR.

Crew Leader First Aid Emergency Protocol				
Is the scene safe?				
Check the Scene	 Look for anything that may threaten your safety or the safety of the 			
	injured person or your crew.			
	• If it's not safe, get yourself to safety and call 911 immediately.			
	If it is safe, isolate injured individuals and assess the severity of the			
	injury.			
	In the event of minor injury:			
Assess the Severity of the Injury	1. Call FOT Lead. Inform them of injury.			
	2. Ask injured person if they can walk and are comfortable being moved.			
	DO NOT MOVE IF INJURED PERSON SUFFERED ANY HEAD OR SPINE			
	INJURY (See below section on major injury).			
	3. If there are two Crew Leaders:			
	 Have one CL escort the injured person back to staging site and 			
	the other continue on with the planting.			
	4. If there is one Crew Leader:			
	 An FOT staff will come to pick up the injured person. 			
	5. First Aid Kits			
	 Each partner crew pair will be equipped with a field first aid 			
	kit. If you need access to one, contact your partner crew. FOT			
	Staff also has a more comprehensive kit at the staging site.			
	In the event of major injury:			
	1. Call 911.			
	Do not hesitate if the injured person has: severe bleeding, loss			
	of consciousness, head or spine injury, shortness or loss of			
	breath, change in mental status, chest pain, or coughing up or vomiting blood.			
	2. Call FOT Lead . Inform them of the incident.			
	3. Manage the situation as best you can. The Crew Leader is in charge of			
	managing the situation until FOT staff arrives. Keep everyone calm and			
	organized. Enlist help from capable individuals if necessary.			
	4. Support FOT staff when they arrive . It is likely that they will require			
	assistance with the injured, crowd control, or helping to direct			
	emergency personnel to the scene.			
	1. Check in with FOT Staff and crew.			
After the Situation	 If the situation permits, return to planting. If not, return to 			
	staging site. Make sure remaining volunteers are comfortable			
	with continuing.			
	2. Fill out Injury Report Form when you return to the staging site.			

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As a Crew Leader, take care of yourself. First and foremost, your own safety is your number one priority. If there is a situation that you deem unsafe, retreat, call 911 immediately, and then inform FOT staff.

- If an incident occurs while in the field with a crew, the Crew Leader is the point person in charge of managing the incident until an FOT staff person arrives and takes over.
- FOT Staff should always be made aware of any incident, regardless of the level of severity.

In the event of an earthquake:

Your number one priority is the safety of yourself and your family. Please know that Friends of Trees does not expect you to stay, and be responsible for volunteers. Below, we have lined up recommended best practices to follow, after a large scale earthquake event.

Crew Leader Earthquake Protocol		
Immediately After an Earthquake	 Be prepared for aftershocks. Look around before coming out from under shelter or uncovering your head. Check yourself to see if you are hurt and help others if you are trained to do so. Do not enter damaged buildings. If you are in a damaged building, go outside and quickly move away from the building. Make contact with family/friends. Text messages are the best form of contact. Save phone calls for emergencies. Register yourself on Red Cross "Safe and Well" site Safeandwell.communityos.org 	
Seek Out Neighborhood Resources	 Fire and Rescue services may not be available. Seek out the closest Neighborhood Emergency Meeting Area where local trained volunteers will be gathering in the event of an earthquake (see map in binder at FOT staging site). This is the best place to seek help if you are unsure of what to do or require medical assistance. Look to volunteers and people in the neighborhood to provide assistance. care of your health and safety first! Don't try to be a hero.
